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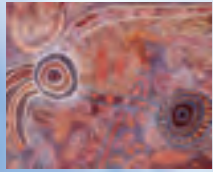

UniSA has been a true trailblazer in providing industry-focused education, producing world-class research, investing in new infrastructure, and creating new opportunities and pathways for greater access into higher education.

We're South Australia's largest university and a leading provider of education internationally. We're ranked amongst the best young universities in the world and are recognised for our overall excellence, approach to teaching, research, international outlook, facilities, innovation, and more.

## Our products

We offer more than 200 world-class degrees designed in partnership with industry and in areas of current and emerging demand. This includes, health, education, business, engineering, information technology, visual effects, aged care and the creative industries.

## Tomorrow's professionals

Our graduates are highly adaptable to the changing global landscape because we embed practical learning opportunities and experiences into every program. This includes internships and placements, real-world projects, industry and employer masterclasses, as well as volunteering and community-based programs. Our health students alone, complete more than one million placement hours each year. And, in total, our students complete around 270,000 placement days across 2,500 locations each year.

Our dedicated Career Services team also provides mentoring to students when mapping their future careers and provide resources to help build their personal portfolio. In addition, the UniSA+ Award and ASPIRE Award help students to explore the practical skills needed in modern leadership, entrepreneurship, cultural understanding and self-awareness.

## Going global

We provide our students with opportunities to broaden their thinking through a range of global and virtual experiences, including student exchanges, study tours, overseas internships and projects, and volunteering. Providing an international perspective enriches the overall study experience and provides insight into industries, cultures and new practices around the world.

## Improving access

Access and inclusion are in our DNA. They're a cornerstone of our foundation and future, underpinned by our Founding Act (1990). In fact, we were the first university to appoint a Pro Vice Chancellor with the task of improving access to tertiary education back in 1993.

Since then, we have made university study a reality for the most diverse student community in the state. We're South Australia's leading university for students with a non-English speaking background, disability and low socio-economic status. We also have the largest cohort of regional and Aboriginal students, along with female students completing studies in non-traditional areas (2020 Department of Education, Skills and Employment Data – Equity Groups).

The introduction of UniSA College has been a key pillar to our success. Through a suite of alternative entry programs, students are able to access pathway options into university. The Education Futures Outreach Team also engages with schools and the community to further encourage students to pursue tertiary learning.

Research degrees at UniSA are project-based, focused on producing new knowledge, providing solutions to global challenges, and preparing candidates for competitive careers. Our research environment is supported by strong connections to industry, government and communities; built upon a culture of collaboration that brings the best minds together to solve real-world problems with a multidisciplinary approach.

Students are able to Study On Demand with the ability to learn in short blocks and access an online learning environment anywhere, any time and on any device. Students can also access personalised support services over extended hours, seven days a week.

The fully interactive, media-rich experience is designed to enhance learner engagement. There are online communities for support and discussions, capabilities to build an e-portfolio, sit an exam online and participate in virtual classrooms with dedicated course facilitators. ## Community clinics and public service

### At the heart of health

Our community health clinics provide our students valuable clinical practice and the public with quality, low-cost exercise physiology, physiotherapy and podiatry services. We also have two city-based medical clinics that offer general practitioner and allied health services to the wider community. UniSA's joint venture with BreastScreen also helps to provide highly accessible mammography services.

### Supporting a strong society

Seeking justice and supporting equality as the foundations of a strong and fair society, our Legal Advice Clinic offers confidential, free advice on wills, power of attorney and personal injury matters. Our Tax Clinic also allows our students to provide support to unrepresented taxpayers under the supervision of qualified tax professionals. Located at Magill Campus, our Psychology Clinic delivers affordable, high-standard psychology and counselling services.

### Giving good advice

Home to the Ehrenberg-Bass Institute for Marketing Science and leaders in brand management research, we established a Marketing Clinic based at City West Campus. Under the supervision of qualified marketing practitioners and academics, the Marketing Clinic is staffed by students who provide free and confidential marketing advice to small and medium enterprises (SMEs). Because we're a young and agile university, and we're good at what we do, we have built a culture of collaboration that brings our brightest minds together to solve problems in a multidisciplinary environment.

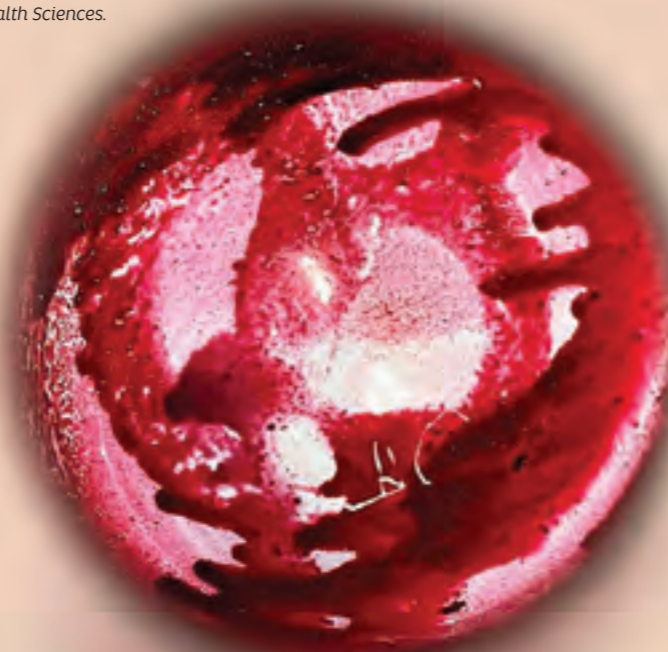

## Our enterprising research and partnerships

### Advanced Manufacturing

#### Laser focused

Minerals processing machinery is expensive and endures extreme levels of wear and tear induced by competitive impact. Researchers from UniSA's Future Industries Institute have teamed up with industry to develop some of the world's most resilient minerals processing equipment through the use of composite coatings and laser cladding.

### Community and Social Services

#### Healing potential

Aboriginal Peoples were the first to research and understand the effects of Australian plants, with thousands of years of accumulated knowledge about their properties and how to best use them. A long-term partnership between UniSA researchers and Chuulangun Aboriginal Corporation is leading the way in understanding the healing potential of plant species used in Aboriginal medicine, while also creating a model for equitable partnerships and benefit sharing between Aboriginal and Western scientific researchers.

#### Healthy ageing

Investigative work conducted by UniSA researchers was instrumental in building the foundation for the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety – a deep dive into the aged care sector in Australia, focusing on systemic failures and ways to better deliver core services.

#### Redefining child protection

UniSA researchers from the Australian Centre for Child Protection are leading the development of new approaches to preventing and responding to child abuse and neglect, challenging the key assumptions which have underpinned child protection research and system design for the past two decades. The Centre has spearheaded the application of contemporary evidence, research and a public health approach, resulting in rapid research translation, close collaboration with partners, and policy and practice reforms.

### Defence

#### The best defence

We're one of Australia's leading defence universities. It's part of UniSA's strategy to partner with defence companies to support their education and research needs. We collaborate with large defence companies such as BAE Systems, Saab, Lockheed Martin and the Defence Science Technology Group, along with hundreds of small-to-medium companies who are critical to the nation's defence industry.

UniSA has also signed an MoU with leading defence contractor, Babcock Australasia, to provide soldiers with 'best of breed' products, systems and emerging technologies to defend the nation with the latest advances in modern warfare. The partnership will offer opportunities in the LAND125 Phase 4 Project, with a focus on technology development, postgraduate research and graduate pipelines.

#### Ready for combat

Saab Australia and UniSA are collaborating on the design of new combat consoles for Australia's fleet of submarines and ships, bringing together the knowledge and design of defence technologies with industrial design capabilities and expertise in human factors. Saab has been selected to provide the combat management system and tactical interfaces for all ships in the Royal Australian Navy and the research group will be based on campus.

### Data driven

The world has seen a rapid increase in the amount of data available on everything from our health and education, to our national security. While this huge bank of information holds enormous potential, finding a way to present it in a usable format is a key challenge shared across a range of sectors. UniSA is working with BAE Systems and IMCRC to develop simple visual methods for representing complex data to map the operational and service histories of warships.

### Education and Training

#### Voices for a better future

Decisions that affect children's lives are made every day, often with little input from children themselves. In partnership with Australian Department of Education, local communities and most importantly, children, we have found a better way. Through this partnership we have developed the *Children's Voices Principles*, which involves talking with children about their lives and needs, and encouraging them to become involved in the decisions that impact them most.

### Energy, Resources and Mining

#### On-track for big savings

Software developed by UniSA and industry partners, TTT and Modaxo, uses information about a train, its route and schedule to calculate efficient driving strategies and advises drivers when to accelerate and brake to ensure they are on-time and with minimum energy use.

This trademarked software known as Engerymiser, is now on trains across the UK, Belgium, France, Spain, Germany, China, India, Australia, New Zealand and Africa, saving rail companies up to 20 per cent of their energy costs.

### Engineering and Construction

#### Shatterproof

UniSA has partnered with Adelaide-based company, SMR Automotive, to deliver the world's first shatterproof plastic car mirror. By combining materials already available to the car industry, the new design capitalised on existing availability, while also simplifying assembly. Weighing 50 per cent less than a conventional glass mirror, the plastic mirror has reduced fuel consumption and emissions. Its durability has also increased safety and reliability for the automotive industry, with a significant drop in mirror failure.

#### Tech giants

Engineering and information technology students now have access to the latest software through a \$450 million commercial grant from tech giant Siemens to prepare them for Industry 4.0. It allows them to explore trends in improved automation, machine-to-machine communication, artificial intelligence, and continued digitisation of manufacturing.

### Environment and Water

#### World heritage bid

Thanks to a team of UniSA researchers and students, people can now become virtual tourists of the iconic Flinders Ranges. An immersive 360-degree tour will 'teleport' them into the deep past documenting the geoscientific significance of this 600-million-year-old landscape. Its scale and grandeur will be revealed by 3D flythroughs providing a bird's-eye view of Ikara (Wilpena Pound). People can see how a giant asteroid slammed into South Australia 580 million years ago, have the chance to explore Paralana Hot Springs and Mount Gee, and go deep underground at the Blinman Heritage Mine. This project is also forming part of the South Australian Government's bid for World Heritage Status of the site.



### Food, Wine and Agriculture

#### Riding strong

Equine gastric disease affects millions of horses worldwide. Standard treatment is a daily oral paste, but it can be ineffective in some cases and many horses don't accept it willingly.

An eight-year joint project between UniSA and animal health industry partner, Luoda Pharma, has produced a long-acting gastric ulcer medicine, which is injected weekly and provides much faster relief and healing.

### Health, Medical and Care

#### Pandemic drone

UniSA partnered with the world's oldest commercial drone manufacturer, Draganfly Inc, to develop world-first technology that can remotely detect and monitor key symptoms of COVID-19, including breathing and heart rates, temperature and blood oxygen levels. Within months, the technology was adopted by security cameras and kiosks, capable of scanning vital signs in 15 seconds.

#### Cancer hope

In partnership with medical device company, Ferronova, a team of experts from UniSA have developed a biodiagnostic system to refine cancer detection. It consists of a magnetic probe (which is the size of a ball-point pen) and injectable tracers, that can detect the spread of cancer less invasively than existing methods. It also delivers a more accurate and affordable system for the staging of deep or complex cancers, such as head and neck, gastrointestinal and oesophageal cancers.

#### A silver lining

Vaccinations are the world's frontline defence against infectious diseases. UniSA researchers have revolutionised vaccination and drug delivery through the development of self-sterilising microneedle patches, which not only sterilise the injection site, but are also fully dissolvable. This is a giant step in providing safer vaccinations and reducing infections from improperly sterilised syringes and needles.

### Viral expert

The COVID-19 global health pandemic has fundamentally changed the way we live. Epidemiologist and UniSA Professor, Adrian Esterman, has been a guiding voice to the community. He's conducted regular interviews and stories with local, national and international media about the virus, our vaccination program, and ways to manage the disease as Australia moves towards a new COVID-normal lifestyle.

### A mind for mental health

One in five Australians will be impacted by a mental health condition during their lifetime and suicide continues to be the leading cause of death among people aged 15-49. That's why UniSA is taking a seat at the table to tackle Australia's mental health crisis. Professor Nicholas Procter is the only South Australian representative on the National Suicide Prevention Taskforce, charged with developing a country-wide suicide prevention plan. Professor Procter's research and experience shows that suicide is still the most stigmatised experience in public health, which creates the biggest barrier for people seeking help.

### Healthy cells

Using advanced computing simulation, UniSA's world-leading radiation oncology and radiobiology researchers can analyse and predict the combination of treatment for hard-to-treat cancers. Our technology allows us to grow biologically correct tumours that represent a patient's cancer, to measure how quickly it will grow and how aggressively it may spread. By predicting the best treatment plan and providing the right schedule and dose that will target the cancer while sparing healthy cells, we're one step closer to winning the war on cancer.

### Flying high

UniSA has proudly sponsored and partnered with the Adelaide Football Club since 2018, celebrating a powerful collaboration between two South Australian brands, both focused on reaching new heights in human performance. The partnership provides opportunities for student placements, research collaborations and study access to the men's and women's rookie squads with a focus on increasing knowledge in sport science and the business of sport.



### Professional and Commercial Services

#### Digital business

UniSA has joined forces with global powerhouse, Accenture, to transform business education and digital skills in Australia. The Innovation Academy in Digital Business will combine industry best practice with our proven leadership in business teaching and research, delivering innovative curriculum and training programs, including the first offering – the Bachelor in Digital Business.



#### Marketing gurus

Creativity is often considered an art rather than a science, yet both are needed to deliver advertising success. The Ehrenberg-Bass Institute for Marketing Science is leading research that focuses on the development of empirically grounded knowledge that helps brands to understand the mechanics behind marketing and how to spend their advertising dollars in the right way. The Institute's multi-million-dollar corporate research and development program delivers world-leading marketing insights to companies such as Procter & Gamble, CBS and Nestlé.

UniSA is leading the world's first study into the psychosocial safety climate of workplaces through the Centre for Workplace Excellence (CWeX). A national and international research platform will be established to explore the global trends in increased anxiety and depression and the rise in psychologically unhealthy workplaces with the aim of improving conditions and productivity.

#### Business growth

The Australian Centre for Business Growth works to help small-to-medium enterprises (SMEs) reach their potential with the latest research, training and advice.

#### Space

##### Smart satellites

UniSA is proud to lead the largest investment in space industry R&D, along with a network of national and global partners. The Cooperative Research Centre for Smart Satellite Technologies and Analytics (SmartSat CRC) is aiming to lift Australia's space industry to A\$12 billion and generate an extra 20,000 jobs by 2030.

#### Out of this world

As humanity looks to expand its presence beyond Earth, the wellbeing of women and men who undertake off-plane activities remains a top priority. With space missions likely to become longer over the coming years, developing reliable ways to monitor the health of astronauts is crucial. UniSA is working with NASA to develop non-invasive sensors to monitor health through the testing of bodily fluids, such as sweat and saliva, to identify potential issues quickly and easily.

#### Technology, Computing and AI

##### Virtual realities

Our Australian Research Centre for Interactive and Virtual Environments (IVE) is a world leader in augmented and virtual reality technologies, partnering with companies such as Google, Saab, Amazon and Siemens to solve large-scale industry challenges.

##### Partners in IT

UniSA has partnered with global IT giant, DXC Technology, to support the next generation of IT innovators, by connecting students with industry to explore and exchange new ideas. This partnership was the first of its kind in Australia and incorporates internship opportunities where students can learn from world-class experts in their field.



#### Data made easy

UniSA's spin-off company, Myriota, is changing the game of data distribution. Raising A\$28 million in funding, the company is growing its satellite network to support billions of devices and make data more accessible for all Australians.

#### Elderly care

To address widespread apathy and to improve mental health in aged care, UniSA is collaborating with Helping Hand to introduce residents to virtual reality (VR) technology. The innovative tool enables seniors to relive happy memories through a 360-degree experience. Residents with the highest apathy showed the most improvement, suggesting VR may be part of ongoing care solutions.



#### Tourism, Arts and Creative Industries

##### A new dawn

UniSA has partnered with one of Australia's most successful visual effects companies, Rising Sun Pictures, giving film and television students the opportunity to complete part of their degree in professional film studios, working alongside some of the best in the movie business. They also provide student placements and mentorships, investing back into this growing and ever-evolving industry.

## Culture of reconciliation

UniSA has a proud history in Aboriginal education and is a strong advocate for reconciliation.

The *UniSA Act 1990* established the University, and set as its core, legislative commitments to support Aboriginal Peoples and tertiary education.

In 2014, we released our first Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), which laid the groundwork to become the 'University of Choice for Aboriginal Peoples' based on building greater respect, awareness and visibility of Aboriginal Peoples and culture.

Then in 2018, we released our first Stretch RAP, which set new commitments that would see Aboriginal voices and knowledges inform and guide UniSA's education, employment, research and engagement.

We're now working towards a second Stretch RAP (2023-25), which will celebrate our successes and expand on the achievements to date, with a key focus on developing the Aboriginal Knowledges Centre to deliver Aboriginal curriculum and institutional cultural competency.

## Doing it proppa

Our *Yurirka: Proppa Engagement with Aboriginal Peoples* was developed as a guide for UniSA staff and students to support respectful and meaningful conversations with First Nation Peoples. This was a collaboration between UniSA and our Elders in Residence, with recognition to Uncle Lewis O'Brien for his knowledge of language and bringing 'Yurirka' – the Kurna word for attentive.

## Power of language

UniSA's APY Hub in Ernabella is deeply connected with Anangu (Pitjantjatjara and Yankunytjatjara) communities through specialised language and culture courses. The APY Hub has developed a strong partnership with Iwiri Aboriginal Corporation (a member-based organisation for Anangu living in Adelaide). Through the COVID-19 pandemic, UniSA partnered with the Department for Education and Iwiri to produce online modules (including film and digital content) as professional development resources for local and non-local educators working in Anangu schools.

## Meaningful mentorship

In 2017, UniSA announced a 10 year partnership with CareerTrackers – a non-profit organisation that creates internship opportunities for Aboriginal university students, which align with their degree and career goals. It's aimed at supporting students by linking them with private sector employees to participate in paid multi-year internships, and full-time employment upon completion of their degree.

## Pathway to the future

The Aboriginal Pathway Program is offered to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students through UniSA College as an alternative pathway into a bachelor degree at UniSA. The program is free and provides additional support to help students succeed at the tertiary level.

## Purkarnintha in Residence

UniSA is fortunate to have the guidance of seven senior Aboriginal Elders, who have kinship ties across South Australia, to form our Purkarnintha in Residence (Elders in Residence, EIR).

The EIR play a critical role in growing and developing relationships between local Elders and the University. The group provides opportunities for Elders to share their knowledge and leadership with all UniSA staff and students, and enables the positive contributions that Elders can make to daily life on campus. Elders hold a wealth of experience and values that can be applied across the UniSA community on an ongoing basis.

Through UniSA's new Aboriginal Knowledges Centre, we'll create a hub for collaboration based on respectful two-way knowledge sharing. It will help to respectfully embed Aboriginal knowledges and cultures at UniSA and also help to strengthen the university experience for Aboriginal students.

## Adelaide. Designed for Life.

UniSA is based in the heart of Adelaide, Australia's most liveable city. Adelaide is a city shaped by stories. The first of these stories were created by the Kaurna people of the Adelaide Plains. Adelaide is also a global study destination and has been ranked in the top 35 best student cities worldwide by Quacquarelli Symonds (QS). Adelaide is known for education excellence, balanced lifestyle and the ability to turn career ambitions into a reality through global industry connections, support of startups and leadership in growth areas such as health, engineering, food and wine, creative and high technology, advanced manufacturing, space, minerals and energy.

## City West

Set on the western end of the city's central business district, this campus is home to our programs in business, law, contemporary art, design, architecture, and creative industries. It's also the backdrop of the impressive Pridham Hall, Samstag Museum of Art, Bob Hawke Prime Ministerial Centre, the South Australian School of Art Gallery (SASA), the award-winning Jeffrey Smart Building and the nation's first Architecture Museum. The Bradley Building in Adelaide's BioMed City and our futuristic museum of discovery, MOD, also form part of this campus community.



## City East

Home to our health-related programs, this campus features the very latest in teaching and research facilities, including purpose-built laboratories, simulated learning spaces and community health clinics, fitted with industry-standard equipment and technologies. The unique Horizon Hospital and Health Service (HHHS) is modelled on real-world settings, providing nursing and midwifery students with vital experience in a clinician-led simulated health environment and connecting them with a virtual health community.



## Magill

Nestled within the lush foothills of Adelaide's eastern suburbs, this picturesque campus is a meeting place of the arts and social sciences. It's here that our future teachers, social workers, psychologists, journalists and filmmakers begin their journey. Featuring industry-standard facilities like fully equipped TV and radio studios, it's also home to one of the largest green screens in South Australia and the Samsung SMARTSchool – a high-tech teacher training facility powered by the latest learning technologies.



## Mawson Lakes

Positioned next to South Australia's Technology Park, this campus is the natural fit for staff and students within the disciplines of STEM. Located on campus are the multi-million-dollar Future Industries Institute (FII), immersive virtual teaching environments, and laboratories focused on robotics, augmented reality, geotechnical engineering, and more. Mawson Lakes Campus is also home to its own solar power research field and has over 5,000 solar panels, reducing around 1,275 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions every year.



## Mount Gambier

Located on the scenic Limestone Coast and in South Australia's largest regional city, this campus brings together collaborative learning spaces and specialist teaching facilities for education, health and social work students. The recently constructed Mount Gambier Learning Centre has tripled the size of our facilities and enabled up to four times as many students to participate in our programs.

The Mount Gambier Campus is also home to the National Institute for Forest Products Innovation Hub – a partnership between UniSA and the state and federal governments, focusing on new research and solutions for the forest industry that will fuel greater economic growth in regional South Australia.

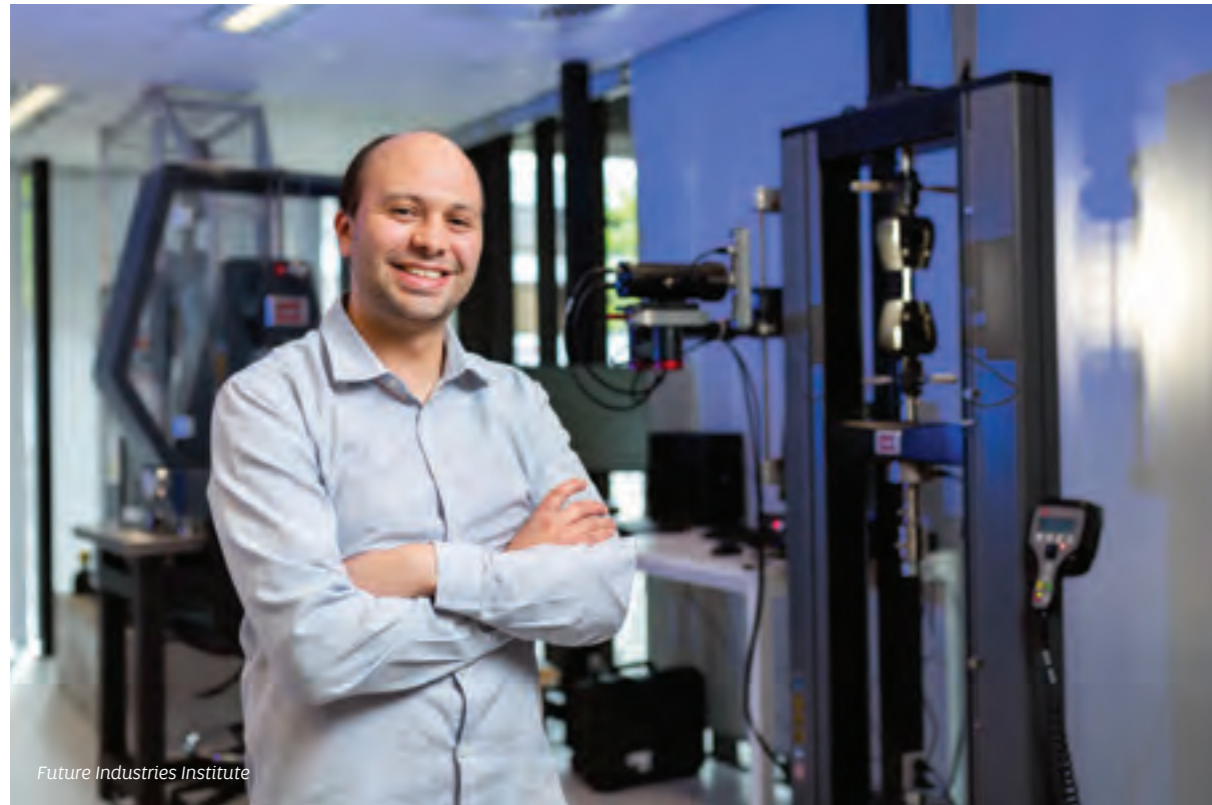


## Whyalla

This is the largest regional university campus in South Australia, serving the local community of Whyalla and extending to the western and northern parts of the state. Situated on a 22-hectare site, it boasts excellent teaching, research and on-site accommodation facilities.
